Narrative:

1.5 million shelter animals are killed each year through euthanasia. This could be done for a vast number of reasons including overcrowding, complex health issues, or aggression toward humans or other animals. Although the number of animals euthanized each year has continued to decline, the resources are not available to eradicate it completely.

One of the main reasons for the decline in euthanasia is the over 10,000 rescues in the United States whose mission is to eradicate the practice. These rescues utilize volunteer foster homes, animal training, and a personalized approach to rehabilitating dogs. This can help traumatized dogs who might be aggressive in a loud, crowded, and high-stress shelter adjust to home in a patient and loving environment.

JR Pups N Stuff has adopted out over 10,000 animals using the foster to adopt method. Their mission is the eradication of euthanasia and they are having an impact one animal at a time. Every single year they grow in their adoption numbers; however, they are reaching the maximum capacity of their current facility which acts as a processing center for the animals before being picked up by their foster parents.

The goal of the facility update would be to increase the quality of care while decreasing the animal's stress level. Many animals come in traumatized. Keeping them comfortable and healthy while also processing them can be a hard balance to find. The intake process includes a bath, a vet check, and taking vitals. This can be stressful especially if the animal has been transported over long distances, which many of them have. The objective for the update would be twofold: increase the intake speed by 10% and increase the rescue capacity by 10%.

Please provide a detailed description of the project plan and its impact for the animals area well as the agency or organization.

JRs Pups N Stuff is requesting funding to update the current facility. This facility is owned by the organization and acts as a rescue intake and a temporary holding facility while animals wait for

medical treatment or to go to their foster homes. While many animals do not spend a lot of time in this facility, it is absolutely critical to the success of the rescue.

The facility is most animal's first stop after a long drive or coming from a potentially traumatic experience. Having a clean and comfortable experience for them is essential. The project would have three main pieces. The first piece would be to have dedicated bath stations. All animals receive a bath when they go through the intake process. Current intake baths are done using hoses and typically outside except during winter months.


The second of three project pieces would be to have rooms for veterinary care. Once again, all animals coming into the rescue get a vet check. Having the ability to bring vets to us instead of transporting them to offices would take a lot of stress off the animals. It can also save money in the long run with transportation costs.

The third piece is installing additional kennels for the temporary housing of the animals before they are picked up by their foster families. More kennels mean more animals can be housed and processed in comfortable conditions. Some of the kennels would be built as quiet rooms to help the most traumatized animals rest in a quiet space.

These three updates to the facility will help increase the efficiency of the rescue while creating a more comfortable environment and intake process for the animals. For any animal, the intake process can be terrifying and triggering, but our goal is to reduce the stress on the animals while allowing us to expand our operations and the number of animals we help yearly.
